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

Bud Spindt *Floating in Green*, cast glass, Oahu, \$2,100 Early this year, I was delighted to be asked to serve as the 2013 juror for the Hawaii Craftsmen Annual Show. Though not acquainted with the organization, I accepted with honor and great curiosity, attracted by the opportunity to be introduced to Hawaiian contemporary craft and to be

exposed to those cultural and economic aspects which shape it, such as: the geographic insularity of the archipelago; the centuries-old multiculturalism that informs so distinctively the rich history of the islands; and the conspicuousness of nature with its wealth of resources and inspiration. I was also excited to be given the opportunity to travel outside of Oahu to three of the neighboring islands (Hawaii, Maui and Kauai) to meet the local artists and experience the sense of place, which is so important with craft.



The final juried exhibition is the result of the overwhelming and absorbing experience of meeting the community of artists and makers and engaging my eyes and hands in "conversation" with each object that was submitted. It would be a mistake to write that there is one single 'language' in craft, such as the material, the skill of the artist, or the narrative content of the piece... for in craft, the

choice of medium, technique, form, tradition or innovation informs also the language in which that very craft is "spoken" and understood. Nature, with its materials, and technology, with its techniques, offers skilled men and women opportunities to explore the manifold avenues of creativity. Wood, as an example, offers the artist the challenge and the opportunity of turning on a lathe a large calabash from a enormous stump, or carving a beautifully rendered miniature of an animal from a piece of wood no bigger than a nut. The pieces selected for this exhibition explore exactly this ability of craft to conjugate nature and skill in ways that from object to object stress one or more of the following: the beauty of the material, the sensuality of the form in relation to the medium, a narrative twist, the richness and attractiveness of historical references, the exploration of new techniques... this show captures all of these avenues.

I was welcomed with warmth by the community of artists, and as I traveled from place to place, a conviction started to form in me: that it is indeed such embracing openness of the locals towards life and people that constitutes the true richness of this community but that is also infused into each of the works that I was examining. And this is not a small feat, for it takes willingness to share knowledge and skills with others to participate in creating a nurturing and supportive artistic environment. This show is a celebration of your healthy community.

Stefano Catalani

Stefano Catalani is the Director of Art, Craft and Design at the Bellevue Museum of Arts in Bellevue, Washington, just outside of Seattle. He has conceived and organized more than 20 acclaimed exhibitions exploring the dynamic fields of art, craft and design. Highly regarded in the field of contemporary art, Catalani has been chosen as a nominator and juror for many awards. An Italian native, Catalani relocated in Seattle in 2001. His classic studies in Italy provided him with a strong theoretical background in art history and philosophy. At BAM, he focuses on the fluidity between art, craft and design, emphasizing both tradition and innovation.

Bernice Akamine

Since that first day, when I walked into the glass studio and gathered glass from the furnace, I was hooked. The heat emanating from the furnace, the roar of the glory hole, the dance like rhythm of the glass blowers and assistants on the hot shop floor, the manipulation of the molten glass on the end of the blowpipe or pontil, all contributed to create a sense of immediacy requiring total focus. After a glass blowing session, I would walk out of the studio feeling exhilarated and craving more.

I create simple abstract glass shapes with smooth flowing lines, at times covered with a form fitted skin of texture and color. My goal when creating is to elicit a response, an emotion, or awaken a repressed memory from the viewer.

Cliff Johns

Design and form have always been of great interest to me. I find woodturning is an excellent way to experiment with both. There seems to be no end to what you find when you explore wood. My woodworking interests developed early in life when my parents built the family's first home in Seattle in the mid 1950's. During high school I worked in construction for a neighborhood contractor. It was during this time in a high school shop class that I developed my love of turning. After high school I entered a four-year apprenticeship program in Seattle and Honolulu to become a journeyman carpenter.

I am so fortunate to have the many beautiful Hawaiian woods available to me here on the Big Island. The woods I use are procured from arborists, tree trimmers, and sites that are being cleared for development. Living in Hawaii has greatly changed my style of work. The wood that is available to work with in the islands has taught me so much in just exploring it, and the environment here has an even greater influence on what I produce.

Jackie Mild Lau

While crafting sculpture in bronze, I embark on a many media journey testing my commitment to an idea, my self-discipline, technical knowledge and vision. For all of its difficulty, working in bronze offers the opportunity to create detailed artwork with the intimacy of clay, the tensile strength of a metal and the durability of stone.

Toying with form, space, scale and a collection of seemingly disparate elements, I like to create surreal mini narratives. Some are puns such as "Piggy Back" and others such as "Watch Out" offer commentary on contemporary issues and human nature. We often are distracted by small things and lose sight of the larger picture. Then again, the source of greatest concern may not be as easy to indentify as it seems.
